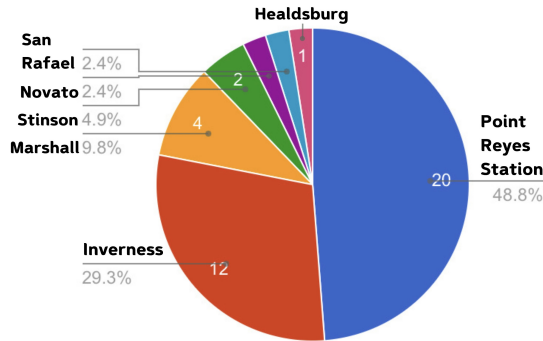


Sports Court Survey Results

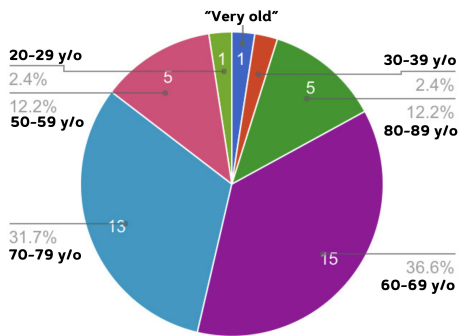

1. Where do you live?



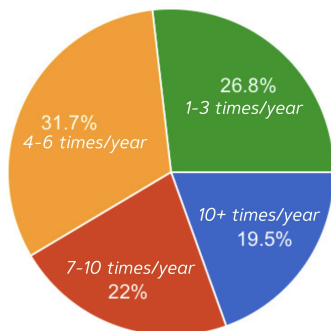

2. How old are you?



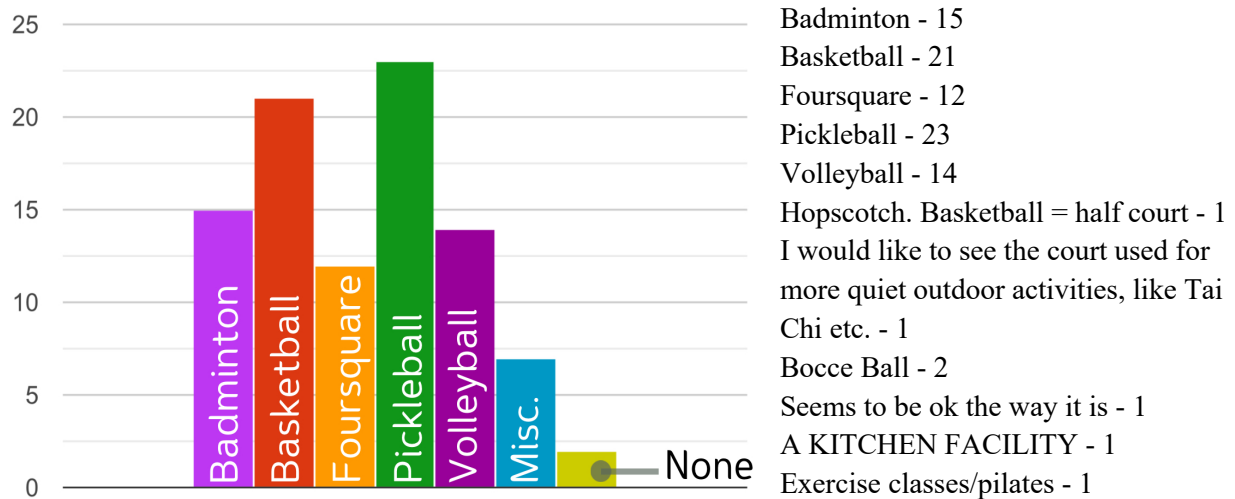

- Sound considerations are important in the neighborhood. Pickleball has widely documented negative noise impact. It is loud. No need to increase the size of the court for other uses.
- I'm concerned about the noise generated by group sports, especially those with known problems like Pickleball. A focus on quieter more arts focused outdoor activities seems more aligned with the charter of the DP as well as having less negative impact on the neighboring wetlands and neighbors. For example drawing painting landscaping (community garden?), stargazing, and discUssions about mitigating climate change, etc. seems to me the school has plenty of room for louder sports activities. I'm not clear what the plans are - how about some written material?

- No lighting. Daytime use only.
- Pickleball is the only sport that should not be included in a sports court at the dance palace. It is too controversial, bringing known noise issues into a quiet neighborhood and setting up an adversarial relationship with the dance palace and it's neighbors. The dance palace has had a long history of being in this location without noise complaints and the neighbors want that to continue. The neighbors also don't want to be put on the spot with a suggested solution that we try it out and see how bad it is. That takes the responsibility away from the dance palace and puts it on the community to monitor, report and document noise issues. A very uncomfortable thing to do especially when the noise makers are friends or acquaintances as many are in this small community. An additional concern is the impact on the adjacent wetlands and the peace and quiet people enjoy there. I think when you look at what is to be gained by adding a 'nuisance' activity like pickleball and what problems it creates you will agree as I'm sure you want to continue the good relationship and support the dance palace has in the community.
